EDITOR'S ANNUAL REPORT FOR *NORDIC STUDIES IN EDUCATION*, VOLUME 31

Present volume of our journal is the second one under its new name *Nordic Studies in Education*, previously *Tidskrift för Nordisk Förening för Pedagogisk Forskning* (1980-1985) and *Nordisk Pedagogik* (1986-2009). During last year like previous 21, i.e. since 1991, the editorial office of *Nordic Educational Studies* has been stationed at the Department of Education and Special Education (previously Department of Education and Didactics), University of Gothenburg. The co-operation with Universitetsforlaget (our publisher since 1988) has also during this year run smoothly like many years back, and the production of the journal has followed the plans. Like previous years the Editorial Board has been identical with the Board of NERA, including treasurer, referee coordinator and editor in chief.

The Editorial Board has met twice during 2011; in Jväskylä 2011.03.09, and in Copenhagen 2011.08.21. The internal work of the board has been running smoothly during the period. 72 (Denmark 14, Finland 3, Norway 39, Sweden 16) manuscripts (last year 62; e.i. + 30%) have been submitted to the *Forum*-section of which 50 were forwarded to the review coordinator, 11 have been accepted (including 'minor changes') for publishing, 10 have been refused, and 27 manuscripts remain to be reviewed (2 were withdrawn). The review process has not been running too smoothly during the period; the routines have to bee changed. Compared to other journals the reviews take much too long time. Too many of the 21 manuscripts needed the maximum period of 6 months (6 within 1-3 months; 8 within 4-6 months; 7 exceeding 6 months).

Nordic Studies in Education is now fully accessible on the web. Through libraries, universities etc. idunn.no has helped readers to electronically fetch articles 12.392 times (7.903 last year). 2011 the fifth most popular article on idunn.se was Thor Arnfinn Kleven's "Validity and validation in qualitative and quantitative research" in NSE no. 3/2008.

Contents of Volume 31

The journal has published 4 separate issues, 313 pages (50% in English) of which one is a Special Issue ("Educating the Global Village"). The *Forum*-section has during the year contained 15 articles and *Book reviews* 2 articles. 11^1 women (70%) and 5 men (30%) have contributed to the content of the journal, a dramatically shift compared to previous year(s), when there were 65% men. The distribution of authors over countries is shown in Table 1 below.

From the Joint Committee for Nordic Research Councils for the Humanities and the Social Sciences (NOS-HS) *Nordic Studies in Education* has received NOK 77.000 for 2012. (NOS-HS has also accepted our application for support for 2013-2014; outcome NOK 154.000.)

The number of subscriptions has decrease dramatically since 2006, which means nearly half the numbers in four years. Two contributing reasons here are foremost: (i) smaller congresses and (ii) 'open access', which in the latter case means a loss of libraries.
